Here is a look at some of what has been going on between October and December:

### **Terry Fox Run**

RWA students in Sec 2 continued the tradition of raising funds for cancer. On October 25, a beautiful fall day, students ran in the area to support this great cause. Special thanks to Mr. Bateman and Ms. O'Neil for all their efforts and thank you to all the staff and the leadership students who came out to cheer our runners on.

### Secondary 1 Trip

On Monday, October 28, Secondary 1 students attended a day camp at Camp Bon Depart in Wentworth-Nord, Quebec. This initiative allows students to connect and develop their team building skills. Small groups of students participated in a variety of physical activities led by animators from Dynamix. 185 students participated at no cost to parents. Funding was provided by the school through an MEQ program. Special thanks to Mr. Aiken for organizing the activity and to all the staff members who participated.

### **Remembrance Day**

RWA took time to acknowledge the sacrifices of our Canadian military veterans with assemblies on November 8th. Special thanks to Ms. Fogel and Ms. Goldsmith, our Personal Development and Community Involvement Animator, for organizing the event.

### **EMSB Educational and Career Fair**

The English Montreal School Board held the annual EMSB Educational & Career Fair (ECF) 2024, to provide students with important educational information. Sec 5 RWA students were given the opportunity to gather information from different representatives of CEGEPs, universities, and vocational education centres (trade programs) in the Greater Montreal area. Such an endeavor serves to help students in planning for their future. Students were transported by bus to St. Piux X Career Centre on Thursday, October 24th.

### **Essential Seminars for Secondary 1 Parents**

On the evening of October 29, 85 parents attending the first of 3 Essential Seminars for Secondary 1 parents titled: "Surviving and Thriving: A Parents' Guide to Early Adolescence and the Transition to High School". The seminar provided parents with insights into adolescent brain development and the potential behaviours within the Royal West experience. The seminar was given by Ms. Almeida and Mr. Mateus, who both work closely with Secondary 1 students through the RWA MindPOP program.

The second edition of the MindPOP Secondary 1 parents seminars took place on the evening of Wednesday, December 4th. It was accessible to parents virtually and was about one hour in duration. The topic is certainly of concern to parents, as social media provides them challenges in finding a balance between what children are accessing and permitting autonomy and privacy.

This seminar, prepared by a post-graduate Concordia student who is researching the relationship of social media and adolescents, provided parents with insights on the various positive and negative websites accessible to students, cited research into the effects of social media on child development, and suggested strategies on how to manage digital use.

Royal West Academy is proud to offer an excellent opportunity to learn more about bees, honey production, and the process in which bee-related products are prepared: the Beekeeping Club.



On October 25<sup>th</sup>, the club had its first meeting in room 204: the annual honey extraction workshop! This activity was organized by Mr. Girardin and *Alvéole*, an organization that aims to improve access to beekeeping as well as to educate people on the importance of bees for the environment.

The activity was led by Colin, the official Beekeeper working at *Alvéole*. He demonstrated the process of honey production and even included honey for the participants to take home! Students were given the opportunity to extract the honey from the frames of honeycomb by uncapping the layers of beeswax. Moreover, we learned about how honey is produced, from bees collecting nectar to honey extraction. Many students, such as Nella F. in grade 11, expressed their satisfaction and were very glad they participated. Nella said, "I had a lot of fun and learned a lot. I also liked eating the honey and the honeycomb. It was wonderful".

Additionally, Colin very kindly agreed to answer some questions I had for him:

Q: Which other schools does Alvéole work with in Québec?

A: We work with many schools, such as John Grant High School, Brébeuf, Allion Elementary, and Twin Oaks Elementary.

Q: What is your goal with working with these schools?

A: To connect people with bees as well as to connect them to each other.

Q: Finally, what is your favorite part of the job?

A: It depends on the time of the year. The jobs vary depending on the months, so there is a lot of diversity in what we do. I like working directly with the bees, which happens during the summer, as well as doing workshops, which take place during the winter.

The Beekeeping Club is a fun, educational, and, some might even say, bee-loved opportunity to learn as well as to earn an ECA credit! A candle-making workshop is rumored to be on the horizon, so pay attention to any announcements in the Daily Bulletin! We hope to see you at the next session of the Beekeeping Club!

This year's competition takes place over four days, from February 19<sup>th</sup> to 22<sup>nd</sup>, at the St. Pius X Career Centre. In this multidisciplinary competition, we compete not only against high schools in the Montreal area, but also against CEGEPS.

When you think of robotics, the first thing that may come to mind is robots. Don't get me wrong: while they certainly are fun and cool, there's so much more to the CRC for students to partake in! The competition includes diverse sections such as website creation, video/film making, programming, tutorial and kiosk, so there's bound to be something for everyone. The Royal West Academy school store (RWA CO-OP) began in 2023. It is a volunteer run enterprise, open daily at lunch, which serves as a second hand uniform shop, school supply store and swag/spirit wear boutique. This may be a store, but it is so much more! Students can volunteer on their

lunch hour to earn ECA credits and referrals for summer job applications. Students create art pieces for decoration and signs for the store, they create "spirit wear" through tie-dye workshops, they express themselves on our "chalk-wall", they stock shelves, do inventory, work the cash, triage the donations, lead the merchandising of our display case, stock the vending machine, all while collaborating with a parent volunteer as well as their peers. Staff and students alike have been influential in what we carry and sell. From art pencils, locks, and science boards, to popcorn and RWA tuques, the store is more than a fundraiser for the school. It is a space where students can purchase items, recommend items, donate items, and be a part of their school store.

### **Royal West Academy PPO News**

The Royal West Parent Participation Organization (PPO) held an evening meeting open to all parents at the school on November 13. The main topic of conversation was safety at the corner of Ainslie and Westminster, after an RWA Sec 3 student was hit by a car there on October 28. PPO parents put together some proposals to try and make the intersection safer for all pedestrians, as well as a petition – directed to the Town of Montreal West and the SPVM - asking for changes to the intersection. The petition was approved by the Governing Board and shared with parents via email. Thank you to all those who signed! We have gathered **over 600 signatures**, and it is now being shared with Montreal West residents, before being submitted to Town Council and the SPVM.

The PPO will continue to explore ways in which that intersection can be improved for pedestrians, and we also hope to look at other issues contributing to the safety of Royal West pedestrians. We are scheduling our next meeting for January and will send it out to those of you who signed up to our email list.
