Royal West Academy PPO News

The Parent Participation Organization gathered 856 signatures from members of both the RWA community and Montreal West, and these were presented to Montreal West Town Council at the meeting in mid-December and presented to the SPVM at a meeting we attended (along with other RWA representatives and local officials) with the Station 9 Commander in January. Thank you to all those who signed this petition, your voices are being heard!

On December 12, Jessica Houde-Woytiuk (Governing Board member), Joanna Duy (PPO Chair), and parent Samara Zavalkoff met with local MNA Desirée McGraw to discuss how we can work together to move the student pedestrian safety dossier forward. We are continuing to work with MNA McGraw to see what role she can play in amplifying our message.

On Monday December 16 we once again had a good turnout of parents and two RWA students at the Montreal West Town Council meeting. We were very proud of the two RWA students who stood at the microphone to share their experiences at the Ainslie intersection with Town Council. It was very impactful.

On Tuesday December 17 the PPO coordinated a student pedestrian counting blitz by parent volunteers to quantify the number of students crossing Westminster at different places and different times of the day. During morning and afternoon rush hour, 491 RWA students cross at the intersection of Ainslie and Westminster, and there are other intersections where many RWA students cross as well, notably Sherbrooke and Westminster. These numbers have been shared with the Town and the SPVM.

Just before the holiday break, we were happy to see that the Town of Montreal West erected flashing stop signs at the corner of Ainslie and Westminster. In addition, the Town is planning on applying for a significant grant from the provincial government to implement changes that should improve pedestrian safety. The SPVM has also been increasing their presence along Westminster South and handing out tickets to drivers. These are steps forward, but there is more work to be done! We look forward to continuing to work closely with the RWA Governing Board and Administration to help prioritize our students' safety.

A word from the RWA Governing Board

The main focus of the Royal West Governing Board this year has been the safety of the streets surrounding our school. In October, an RWA student was hit by a car crossing on the crosswalk at Ainslie and Westminster. The student mainly suffered scrapes and bruises, but the message was clear: the corner must be made safer before anything worse occurs.

Along with the student's parents, Mr. Pita, and members of the RWA Parent Participation Organization (PPO), Governing Board members met with Montreal West officials, the local MNA and the neighborhood SPVM station at Montreal West City Hall to discuss measures to improve street safety. A first step was Montreal West installing a flashing stop sign at the corner in question, as well as the application for a grant from the Quebec government for funds to improve safety in the area. Potential solutions discussed include stopping left turns from Sherbrooke onto Westminster to calm traffic, narrowing the road through the intersection, and building an ilôt in the middle of Westminster to aid in crossing. Quebec regulations technically limit the hiring of crossing guards only to corners serving elementary schools, but the group is looking at ways to widen that scope. The Governing Board also supported the PPO as it wrote and circulated a petition demanding that Montreal West tale action to improve street safety in the area.

Apart from this major action, the Governing Board has also approved the school anti-bullying policy, the ongoing budget, the sexuality education plan, as well as various school trips. At the request of parents, the Governing Board also approved a widening of the dress code to include non-white tops and shorts for the coming year. More specific information will follow.

All parents and members of the RWA community are invited to Governing Board meetings, where there is a Question Period for non-Board members after the official business has been taken care of. The next meeting is Tuesday, February 18 at 7 PM in the school library. Questions can also be sent to the Governing Board via email at rwagb@emsb.qc.ca.


We are incredibly proud of how the store has become an integral part of student life at Royal West Academy, and we

Royal West Academy Takes the Wheel on Road Safety

Every day, the streets surrounding Royal West Academy are bustling with students and cars alike, becoming a cause for concern for the RWA community. Many worry that a disaster could be just around the corner.

This hit home after an RWA student was hit by a car near the school. Thankfully, he was not seriously injured, although many were not as lucky as shown by the SAAQ 2024 Road Safety Report. This is a wake-up call for everyone to look both ways. It should not have taken a near-death experience to realize it was time for change.

The most dangerous intersection near the school is at Westminster and Ainslie, due to many students crossing at all times, the high volume of traffic, and the train crossings. Oftentimes, cars don't stop at the crosswalks or stop signsfailing to see those waiting to pass. The danger is real—not just for RWA students, but for everyone.

A teacher at Royal West, Mr. J. Magee, who almost got hit by a car at the intersection of Westminster and Sherbrooke, shared how his experience was distressing and frustrating. While crossing the street, someone almost hit him while backing up to avoid the train barrier but not noticing the pedestrians walking behind them. It should not be this hazardous just to cross the road.

The RWA administration, the Governing Board, the PPO, the town of Montreal-West, and the SPVM are collectively stepping on the gas by diverging into these issues. PPO meetings are being held to see what can be done to improve road safety in Montreal-West. Principal Mr. Pita mentioned that the school has been in communication with local officials to find solutions, from getting a crossing guard to prohibiting left turns from Sherbrooke and Broughton onto Westminster.

The road to safety isn't a short one, but every step helps, and we've already begun with grants from the *Programme d'aide financière du Fonds de la sécurité routière* and the installation of flashing stop signs which will cause drivers to hit the brakes-literally. Paving the way for change may take time, but every effort brings us closer to safety. It's time to shift gears and ultimately make road safety a top priority—because no life is worth the risk.

Whispers in the halls of people worrying about where to apply for Cegep, hoping they make the right choice. To gain insight, I decided to track down Royal West Academy graduates and ask if they think the Cegep they chose was the best one for them.

While there are so many choices to make between the programs, courses, teachers, and ultimately the school, I narrowed it down to the important basics. All the students said RWA greatly prepared them for their post secondary studies and their current workloads. There are many options for schools, and I got the inside scoop on all there is to know.

Many people I contacted attended either John Abbot or Dawson College. These two schools offer their students many programs and activities. A student from John Abbot stated "I think it's the same as the other options [but I enjoy my program]. The science program is especially good because it's not split into health and applied, it is just pure sciences."

As I spoke to these individuals, they recounted that they have been really missing the simplicity of high school. "There's a lot more independence that I do not appreciate, such as long breaks between classes."

Another option for schools in Montreal is Dawson College. After interviewing someone who goes there, they said "Dawson programs are good but especially for people who live far from downtown wanting to branch out and make new friends."
