In the coming months, they will be going back for two more workshops, leaving them with some very cool objects, stories, and skills that few people have the opportunity to experience today.

Diversity Caravan: Where Culture Meets Curiosity

At Royal West, learning doesn't always stay in the classroom—and Diversity Caravan proves that sometimes the best way to understand the world is to step right into it. This unique activity gives students the chance to explore different cultures and faiths in Montreal through hands-on, real-world experiences that go far beyond textbooks and worksheets.

Started in 2017 by Ms. Trehin, she shared how similar outings inspired her during her undergraduate studies at York and Concordia University. "Those experiences brought everything we were learning in class to life," she explains. Over the years, Diversity Caravan has developed into a program that fosters real connection and understanding, offering students several meaningful opportunities. The goal is simple yet powerful: help students move past stereotypes and appreciate all people who live alongside us in our communities. As Ms. Trehin puts it, "these experiences help bring people closer together while recognizing and appreciating our similarities. So much is similar across cultures and faiths!"

The outings take place on pedagogical days. So far, we have visited Kahnawake in September, where students had the opportunity to: visit an active longhouse with some storytelling and art from community elders, participate in a Lacrosse workshop, and a medicine walk in nature. The outing in November included stops at a Sikh temple and an Islamic Community Center in the South Shore—an unforgettable day of learning, sharing, and discovery. In just one day, students toured sacred spaces, met community members, helped with meal preparation, and got to taste cultural dishes at the Sikh temple. It's not every school activity that lets you learn, taste, and build deeper cultural understanding all at once, and that's what really makes it stand out!

The best part? This activity is accessible to all. There's no cost for students, and they can earn community, culture, or environment credits while sharing in experiences that truly stick with them.

What makes Diversity Caravan special isn't just where it takes you, but what you take away from it. Students come back with a better understanding and appreciation of various traditions, beliefs, and most importantly of each other. It challenges assumptions we may have based on stereotypes and previous biases and celebrates diversity as something to admire rather than fear.

At a school that takes pride in global awareness and strong

community spirit, Diversity Caravan is more than just a day out of classes. It shows that some of the most meaningful learning happens when we step outside of our comfort zones together. At Royal West Academy, this is more than a day out of school—it's a step toward a more connected world.

When I asked her about RWA's view on different cultures, she said, "we have a very welcoming community at Royal West", where everyone can find a safe place to be themselves. The feeling of community is so much bigger than just one classroom. From the second you get in the building, you can see students from different backgrounds working together, laughing in the halls, and doing the same extracurricular activities.

Ms. Cayer explained that the school has a lot of activities to celebrate culture. She specifically mentioned events like Latin Heritage Day, organized by the Spanish class, and Black History Month in February, when presentations and activities are put together to educate the RWA community. The secondary four students learn about celebrations from around the world, while secondary five students focus on Indigenous cultures in Canada. She said, "Respect is very important at our school," and she feels the school really does provide students with a safe environment where their voices are heard, especially when they are worried or uncomfortable.

A Reaction Guaranteed in Organic Chemistry Club

The Organic Chemistry Club has become a steady catalyst for curiosity in the Science pathway for Secondary V. From September to January at Royal West Academy, students are offered a deeper look into the molecular world that shapes everyday life. Mr. James Magee attracts members to participate in insightful lectures on Tuesdays after school, covering beginner CEGEP-level Organic Chemistry (O. Chem.) as an academic booster long before encountering the challenging topics in CEGEP Sciences. "I like teaching it because I can go more in depth than Secondary III Science, and it's more fun to teach advanced ideas. It's also low pressure, with no tests or quizzes," Mr. James Magee states.

Much of the club's learning takes place through detailed discussions, curious questions, and collaborative problem-solving through diverse tasks. We spend our weekly meetings identifying, drawing, naming, and building chemical compounds with molecular model kits and various diagrams. We go beyond the standard curriculum — while nomenclature and molecular structures may sound familiar in Science or Chemistry classes, O. Chem. is an entirely new system that explores the behavior of carbon structures specifically. It's a great "opportunity to get ahead in your scientific knowledge. It's especially fun to attend the club with friends" club member Jaival S. mentions.

Academics aside, the club thrives on the energy and bonds of its members. Between profound conversations and focused study, our tightly knit group blends intellectual rigor with genuine camaraderie. In a school year full of academic pressure, the club offers a place where curious, motivated minds can connect, grow, and reflect on the weekly lectures. After all, in a group built on bonds (both covalent and social), it's no surprise that our chemistry is strong. Kathie W. says "not only have I learned so much, but it has opened a new door on what I may want to do in the future. It's bittersweet knowing that there are only two sessions left". She mentions that the time goes by quickly, so don't let the next electrophile pass you by. If you are passionate about chemistry, and more so the magic of how molecules shape 3D space around us, join Organic Chemistry Club in Secondary V at the beginning of the school year! RWA Launches MUN Club

Luckily, RWA MUN has had a very good relationship with Dawson College's MUN. Their team sends former RWA Alumni to coach, guide, and encourage the team about twice a month, helping them learn new strategies, and plan for future conferences. They will experience the process by spinning rows of honeycombs in a churner to let the honey spill out, and eating some of the fresh honeycomb. I can attest that it was 'un-bee-lievably' delectable. Also, they will be taught in detail about the processes bees use to create honey and how they aid in the pollination of flora. At the end of the workshop, students will each receive a jar of the honey to increase their appreciation for and connection to our buzzy pollinators!

Furthermore, there are more positives about this experience: the honeycombs being supplied from local beekeepers will encourage our local economy. Mr. Girardin states that in order to help our neighbouring community, "most of the supplies [are] local, anything we [buy is] local." From this, the students can acknowledge the significance of bees when it comes to our environment and economy.

On top of that enriching experience, members will have space to flex their creativity with the beehive painting activity. The Beekeeping Club will paint the beehive with special chalk-based, bee-safe paint so that, when it is taken out for the summer, it will have artistic touches of RWA's very own students. Later on, when it's time to sell the honey harvested from the decorated hives, students will label the jars and share the joy of savouring our mouth-watering honey with others.

When RWA students walk into Ms. Jody Cayer's room, it's clear that it's not your ordinary classroom. Wave farewell to those stiff chairs and bulky desks; in Ms. Cayer's class, comfort, accessibility, and individual support are prioritized. Circular rolling tables fill the space, designed for group engagement and conversation. Cozy bean bags are scattered around the room, because sometimes the best ideas come when you're basically horizontal, and all the chairs are rocking-style, allowing for slight mobility for those who need movement or struggle with focus during long periods.

This classroom wasn't just designed with aesthetics in mind, it was an active effort to create a safe and accommodating learning environment. Ms. Cayer said that she adopted this adaptive seating arrangement after reflecting on her students' different working styles. She disliked the idea of anyone being confined to one chair the entire school year; even as a teacher she finds it restrictive to work in the same spot all day.

In classes such as CCQ (Culture and Citizenship in Quebec) and history, Ms. Cayer says that "the one thing [she] noticed is that it really encouraged class discussion". As one of her students, I can definitely back this up. I have never been part of a class with such a positive discussion environment, with students actively making valuable contributions and most importantly, feeling free to speak openly and truthfully as a certain level of comfort is provided through the atmosphere. Of course, every silver lining has a cloud. "Testing days can be tricky", Ms. Cayer admits. "When everyone's supposed to be working independently, sometimes I have to get creative with it." She expresses how she'd love to see more teachers implementing adaptive seating throughout the school. While she acknowledges it's definitely more advantageous for certain subjects, especially those that encourage discussion and debate, such as the languages, CCQ Contemporary World, and History, she says that "it could still work for [other subjects], it all depends on how you adapt to it". But overall, she confirmed that with her classes being closer than ever, breaking down barriers of awkwardness, and simply adding an aspect of comfort to her classroom, all these positives outweigh the small inconveniences, proving that at Royal West Academy learning doesn't have to be stiff, rigid, or boring; it can actually move with you!

Penny Wars: A Competition for a Good Cause

During the first week of December, RWA's long-standing Penny Wars fundraising initiative took place. The goal is to gather donations for the Tyndale St-Georges Community Centre, a non-profit organisation that supports the residents of Little Burgundy, a community that faces difficulties such as poverty, racism, and gentrification. In order to raise as much money as possible, RWA turned the fundraiser into a competition many years ago, and Penny Wars was born.

The rules of Penny Wars are as follows. There are five buckets, one for each of the five grades. Any coins placed in a grade's bucket accumulate points, which are calculated according to the number of cents. Five cent is equal to five points. Bills, however, are called "bombs." Placing a bill in another grade's bucket subtracts the number of cents in the bill from that grade's total points. For example, placing a five-dollar bill in another grade's bucket reduces that grade's points by 500! It's a great way to 'sabotage' the team that's in the lead. The grade with the most points at the end of the week wins an early dismissal in February!

Coins and cash are accumulated in the buckets at lunch throughout the week. I'm in Secondary V, and I knew that bills were accumulating in my grade's bucket, placed mostly by Secondary I students, who were determined to win. By Thursday, my grade was at around -9000 points! However, unbeknownst to the other grades, the Secondary V students had been accumulating coins in Ms. Cayer's classroom throughout the week. Given that she teaches the entire Secondary V grade, it makes a lot of cents that she was rooting for us to win. On the Friday of that week, the Secondary V students headed down to the buckets on the first floor in the west wing. The Secondary V students in Honour Band, which I am part of, led the way while playing and marching to "The Imperial March" from Star Wars. "Although I could have attended an English remediation, I do not regret playing for this event since I knew it was for a greater cause," says Kathie W. Two buckets and a briefcase full of coins were poured into the Secondary V bucket, filling it almost to the brim. That's when the penny dropped for all non-Secondary V students.
